These leaders were simply volunteers who wanted to see the profession of Interpreting grow from a "helper" model to a recognized "profession" in the business world. Who would have thought that we would get to a point where interpreters would be required to have a degree and professional training in the field of interpretation? Alabama is a great state and we have great interpreters but sometimes we lack in the area of volunteerism. The leadership is only as good as the people they represent. There is a quote by Isaac Newton, "If I have seen farther than others, it was because I was standing on the shoulders of giants." If we are to continue growing as a profession and meeting the needs of each individual interpreter within our state we need help from each and every one of you.

I was sitting and talking with an interpreter that I knew in passing but not really well. We began talking about the politics of interpreting in Alabama and in talking I learned a lot about this person. I feel that this person learned a lot about me and for both of us a lot of perceptions were dispelled. It's always interesting how open communication solves so many issues. I learned that this person has a lot to contribute to the interpreting community but felt that they didn't have the experience to make substantial contributions. The truth is that we all have substantial contributions to make and should never feel that our opinions or ideas are not important. I have encouraged this person to take a more active role in ALRID which lead me to this article. I would like to extend an invitation to each and every one of you to become more active in ALRID. It does not matter how long you have been interpreting, if you are an ITP student, if you are a Deaf interpreter, or an interpreter who has been working since Jesus was a boy, you are important to our profession and your



ideas and opinions are not only wanted but are NEEDED!

Please consider this article to be a call to action. If you are not a member of a local AL-RID chapter then join one. If your area doesn't have local chapters form one! Modern technology has made it easier to communicate without meeting face to face but those in person meetings are invaluable. This is a time to network with colleagues and to mentor new interpreters. Your help is also needed on the state level. ALRID can only provide services if we know what services are needed. When no one speaks up how can we know what needs to be done? If you feel things need to change or grow then roll up your sleeves and contribute. If you are not sure how you can contribute contact any board member and ask how you can best help.

In the words of John Quincy Adams, "If your actions inspire others to dream more, learn more, do more and become more, you are a leader." I would like to be remembered as one who inspired others to do more. I volunteered to be on the ALRID board and the ALBIT because I wanted to help make change happen. Now it's your turn to step up and carry the torch. We've come a long way but have many more miles to go and with your help we will accomplish so much.

whelming interest in transfer students from AA programs throughout the country





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

Dr. Standley has taught courses in ASL, Special Education, Deaf Culture, and Educational Implications of Deafness at the University of New Mexico and the University of Central Florida.
